November Highlights

Indian Gaming Magazine —
We were invited to take part in the Tribal Leader Roundtable Spotlighting Gaming, Goals, and Legislative Issues. Gaming is our most significant source of revenue for the tribe and allows us to meet the unique needs of our tribal members. The tribe must leverage its competitive advantages, such as tax exceptions and regulatory flexibility, to build economic independence on tribal federal trust land. A primary concern for our tribe is ensuring that the

federal government meets and expands its trust responsibility to our tribe and that the State of Michigan recognizes its historical responsibilities and acknowledges our inherent sovereignty. - **Benzie Gaming** The Tribe's new gaming facility will be located at 7282 Hoadley Road in Benzonia. Further planning and development are ongoing. The new gaming facility will create much-needed employment opportunities and stimulate economic growth for the Tribe and for the local community. Consistent with the Tribe's policy of maintaining productive, open relationships with neighboring state and local authorities, the Tribe has engaged with relevant state and local officials to apprise them of the Tribe's plans. The Tribe looks forward to continuing to work with these officials, as well as stakeholders and the local Benzie community, to address questions and to ensure that the project aligns with regional interests.
- **During the week of November** <u>18th − 22nd</u>, Vice Chair Rohl, Executive Secretary Miller, Treasurer Swallows, and Sonya Zotigh were out of the office attending the ACA/IHCIA In-Person Training Session in Connecticut, and I attended the 19th Annual Government-to-Government Violence Against Women Tribal Consultation, held in Santa Fe, NM with Court Staff: Veronica Wonegeshik and Carrie Leaureaux. The Office on Violence Against Women is a grant-making agency in the U.S. Department of Justice. They are responsible for conducting annual government-to-government consultations with the leaders of all Federally recognized Indian tribal governments on behalf of the United States Attorney General. The purpose of each consultation is to solicit recommendations from tribal government leaders on the following topics: Administrating tribal funds and programs; Enhancing the safety of Indian women from domestic violence.

- dating violence, sexual assault, homicide, stalking, and sex trafficking; Strengthening the federal response to such crimes; and, Improving access to local, regional, state, and federal crime information databases and criminal justice information systems.







Joe has been practicing traditional healing work for the past 21 years and illustrates traditional values, morals and teachings by living a clean and healthy lifestyle with his wife and daughters. Joe currently works with the Behavioral Health Department at the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians Medicine Lodge as one of

Growing up as a traditional shkaabewis Joe has learned to balance his spiritual and personal life while continuing to always remain humble with the knowledge he carries. He has spent his young and adolescent years learning how to live in duality between the modern world and traditional Anishinaabe world through fasting and attending ceremonies. He currently helps communities and other traditional people and healers when needed allowing his knowledge and traditional teachings to grow.

Spending a life time of listening and learning about himself as an Anishinaabe person, this has allowed him to value and respect all physical and spiritual beings and their protocols. He has had the opportunity of working alongside many respectful elders, and healers to which he has been given teachings and rights to helping his Anishnaabeg relatives with spiritual healing.

Today, Joe has dedicated his time and knowledge to teach and share with others about his cultural experiences and how he has utilized his culture and language to heal himself within his own walk and journey through life. Joe acknowledges that lifelong learning is every day for him and that there is always something new to learn. He promotes cultural sharing and healing to community members so we can all learn to build encouragement on our cultural knowledge and sacred walk through life.

FROZEN PIPES

Discover preventing and thawing frozen water pipes to protect your plumbing

Prevent Frozen Pipes

Water Supply Lines

Close garage doors if water supply lines are present.



Trickle Cold Water

Let a trickle of cold water flow from exposed faucet pipes to prevent freezing.



Air Circulation

Allow warmer air to circulate by opening cabinet & bathroom doors.



Keep Heat Above 55°F

If you're away in the cold weather months, keep home heat +55°F.



Thaw Frozen Pipes

Examine Water Source

If the faucet trickles, suspect a frozen pipe near exterior walls or where water enters your home.



Keep Faucet Open

Leave the tap running to thaw the frozen pipe. Flowing water melts the ice inside.



AVOID Flammable Materals

Use an electric heating pad, hair dryer, or space heater to warm pipe. **DO NOT use blowtorch, kerosene, propane heater, or open flame.**

Call a Plumer

If you can't defrost the pipe or access the frozen area, contact a licensed plumber.



Dobule Check

Inspect all home faucets for more frozen pipes; if one freezes, others might freeze too.

HAND HYGIENE

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) highlights frequent hand hygiene as one of the most important acts in preventing disease. Hand hygiene includes washing and sanitizing hands. Let us review these recommendations about hand hygiene:

- Whenever a messy chore is done, wash your hands, because dirt is visible on the hands. But it is what we cannot see that is dangerous.
- Germs are invisible. Germs are microorganisms such as bacteria or viruses.
- 3. Germs are everywhere. They are within and on our bodies and on every touchable surface.
- 4. Not all germs are bad. Good germs help to keep us healthy and to keep

our immune system strong. On our hands are good germs that live under the deeper layers of the skin, and most are not removed by washing with soap and water.

- 5. Our hands can also have transient, bad germs on the outermost layer that cause illnesses.
- 6. Health experts recommend washing our hands with soap and clean, warm water for at least 20 seconds. Singing "Happy Birthday" twice equals 20 seconds.
 - Be sure to work up a good lather and clean the back of the hands, the wrists, between the fingers and under the nails.
 - Dry them using a clean towel or a hot air dryer.
- 7. Using an alcohol-based hand sanitizer is another way to keep our hands clean. 60% alcohol is recommended.
- 8. If neither soap nor sanitizers are available, follow the above steps with water and vigorous rubbing.
- 9. Let us model good behavior by washing our hands, because our children want to do what we do. Wash babies' hands and teach children to wash their hands after the bathroom and before eating.

Handwashing reminder signs increase frequency and length of handwashing. A cell-phone photo of our children washing their hands can be printed and posted near the sink.

HEALTHY HAND HABITS

So, we must take hand cleanliness seriously by remembering other healthy hand habits:

Learn to control your hands by not coughing or sneezing into hands. A typical human sneeze emits around 40,000 droplets, carrying germs from the mouth. Sneeze or cough into your shoulder or into your elbow.

Let's not put our hands or fingers in your eyes, nose, ears, or mouth.

Germs can live on surfaces from three hours to seven days; germs survive less on dry surfaces. Germs live on shared surfaces such as door handles, counters, phones, remote controllers, keyboards, piano keys, ink pens, sports equipment, handling food, toys, and others' hands. Sometimes, we can handle these items with a tissue. We can turn off water faucets & open many doors with our elbows; latch doors handles can be opened with the ring & pinky fingers of the nondominant hand, often the left fingers. Small hand-sanitizers can fit in our pocket or purse, to use after touching items.

We learned from the COVID Pandemic that the Covid virus is less likely to spread when excellent hand hygiene is practiced. According to the CDC, handwashing can prevent 1 in 3 diarrhea-related illnesses. And handwashing prevents 1 in 5 infections, including the flu, colds, pneumonia, and sore throats.

Worldwide, about 1.4 million children under age 5 die from diarrhea and pneumonia. Handwashing can stop many of these deaths. Why not do what we can to help our children??

This is why we love National Handwashing Week in December, because by this small effort, we can protect ourselves, our family and each other.



Minimize time outdoors Prepare for power outages

Check on elderly & other vulnerable people to make sure they're ok



Keep your pets warm, dry & indoors as much as possible Ensure their food & water doesn't freeze Limit outside time & keep them bundled up



Insulate pipes if possible Open up sink cabinets to expose pipes to heated air Disconnect hoses & turn off water to sprinkles



Know their temperature thresholds

If possible, cover them before the cold weather sets in to help retain some heat.

Pet Safety During the Winter Season

It's important to prepare for winter, not just for yourself but also for your family and pets. Winter weather can pose risks such as power outages, frostbite, snow squalls, high winds, and hypothermia.

Before winter conditions arrive, make your plans now. The MIReady.gov website provides a helpful list of items to assist you in preparing.

EMERGENCY SUPPLY KIT FOR YOUR PET

- Before a winter storm, create an emergency supply kit for your pet that includes:
- Leash and collar
- Transport carrier
- Food and water (5-7 day supply)
- Any medications
- Vaccination history and rabies certificate
- Waste disposal supplies
- A blanket
- A favorite toy
- Your veterinarian's contact information
- Special supplies for smaller pets, such as heat lamps for birds or reptiles
- Ensure pets are current on all vaccinations.

EVACUATION PLAN

- Develop an evacuation plan for your pets. Due to public health reasons, many evacuation shelters may not accept pets.
- Identify pet-friendly locations in case you need to evacuate. Websites like petswelcome.com can help you find

suitable accommodations.

Check with boarding facilities, petfriendly hotels, veterinary clinics, or friends and family outside the impacted area.

IDENTIFICATION

- All pets should have identification, such as a collar with a tag and a microchip.
- Take a photo of your pet and keep it with their medical records.
- Include proof ownership documents like registration, proof of purchase, adoption records, and microchip information.

DURING A WINTER STORM

- Bring your pets inside immediately.
- Avoid leaving pets behind. If there is no other option, leave them loose inside your home with food and plenty of water.
- Never leave your pet chained outside or in a confined space where they cannot escape danger.

AFTER A WINTER STORM

- Be aware that a pet's behavior may change before, during, and after a disaster. Familiar scents and landmarks may be altered, causing confusion for your pet. Leash your pets when they go outside for the first few days after the disaster, and maintain close contact.
- Gradually reintroduce food in small servings, especially if your pets have gone without food for an extended

period.

WINTER-RELATED ILLNESSES

 Prolonged exposure temperatures, wind, or moisture can cause cold-related illnesses in pets. Seek veterinary care immediately if these conditions are suspected.

ANTIFREEZE

• Ingesting antifreeze can be fatal for dogs and cats. Clean up any spills immediately.

FROSTBITE

Signs of frostbite may not be obvious at first. Look for a white, waxy, or pale appearance on extremities (toes, nose, ears, tail), cold skin, and loss of feeling. Pets are particularly vulnerable to frostbite on their ears, tails, and paws.

HYPOTHERMIA

• Hypothermia occurs when the core body temperature drops too low, impairing normal muscle and brain function. Signs of hypothermia include extreme shivering, slow shallow breathing, pale or blue gums, and unresponsiveness. Warm your pet slowly, focusing first on the body core rather than the extremities. Provide warm broth or food instead of hot drinks.

If you cannot bring your pet inside, ensure they have adequate shelter to stay warm. Pets that live outdoors will require more food in winter to generate the extra calories needed to maintain their warmth.

Dear Grand Traverse Band Community Members,

The holiday season is a time of joy, celebration, and cherished traditions. However, it's also a season that brings unique fire hazards into our homes and communities. As your Fire Chief, I want to share some important fire safety tips to ensure you, and your loved ones have a safe and Merry Christmas.

HOLIDAY FIRE SAFETY TIPS

1. Christmas Trees

- If you choose a real tree, ensure it is fresh and well watered to prevent it from drying out and becoming a fire hazard.
- Keep your tree at least three feet away from heat sources such as fireplaces, radiators, and space heaters.
- Check and turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving your home or going to bed.

2. Holiday Lights and Decorations

SAFE HEATING PRACTICES

Home heating is essential in cold weather, but improper use of heating equipment can be dangerous. Keep these precautions in mind:

- Space Heaters: Use space heaters with automatic shutoff features, and place them on stable surfaces, away from anything flammable. Always turn them off when unattended.
- Fireplaces and Wood Stoves: Clean chimneys and stove pipes annually to prevent buildup. Use fire-resistant mats under stoves and a protective screen in front of fireplaces.


