I hope you are all enjoying your summer and spending time with family and friends. At this time of writing this article, we are just coming off of a busy week. We had the Language Conference, Health Fair and Pow Wow

this past week. Council has also conducted Government Department Orientations this month. Additional Sept. highlights are outlined below:

TRIBAL COUNCIL GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Tribal Council continues to work on developing sustainable and achievable Tribal Council Goals and Objectives. We identified several areas requiring attention. We've also identified common goals including updates to Health and Behavioral Health, Human Resources, Higher Education, Housing, Human Services, and direct program services. We are working to finalize our priorities and will publish our Goals and Objectives upon completion.

LANGUAGE CAMP

The 2024 Family Anishinaabemowin Language Camp was held at the Strongheart Center from Sept. 13-12th. It was an honor to welcome our friends from all around Turtle Island and beyond.

SLEEPING BEAR DUNES

On Sept. 10th I was invited to attend an event to greet Senator Peters' and his staff as they toured Sleeping Bear Dunes. Treasurer Frankenberger was also in attendance. It was a beautiful day for the group tour.

CRYSTAL RIVER

Secretary Miller and I joined the Crystal River Restoration Project Team at the Crystal River Float and Pre-Construction Ceremony on **Sept. 12**th! With construction of Crossing #3 (first crossing downstream of Fisher Dam) happening this September. The Team wanted to move forward with construction in a good way with holding a river connection float from Fisher Dam down to Crossing #3 and concluding with a gratitude ceremony.

POW WOW

It was an honor to welcome everyone to the Kchi Wiikwedong Anishnabe pow-wow here in Peshawbestown. It was wonderful to see so many people in attendance. We were very fortunate that it didn't rain, and the pow-wow was well attended. Our beautiful pow-wow grounds and dance arena were greatly admired and appreciated by all in attendance. Kchi-miigwetch to all of the Staff, the Pow-wow Committee and the volunteers for the planning and hard work to make this gathering possible.

FISHPASS PRESS EVENT

On Thursday, Sept. 5th I attended the Fish Pass Press Event with Senator Peters. The Fish Pass project will replace the Union Street Dam and reconnect the Boardman River to Grand Traverse Bay. Once it's complete, FishPass will sort out and allow native species to pass through and keep invasive species out. Treasurer Frankenberger was also in attendance for the event, along with NRD Staff, and several other agencies involved in the planning and development of this major project.



UPDATE: Higher Education & Adult Vocational Training Guidelines

Attention all Higher Education & Adult Vocational students! Please take note of the following important updates to the guidelines, effective July 17, 2024. The Tribal Council has approved the following changes that will impact undergraduate full-time students as well as AVT/diploma/certificate students:

- 1. The process for **receiving official/unofficial transcripts** and account summaries at the end of the semester/ term for scholarship purposes has been extended from 4 weeks to 8 weeks.
- 2. In the event of a life event preventing a student from **meeting their academic goals**, a letter can be sent to the Higher Education Specialist for consideration to be placed into good standing and become eligible for scholarship.
- 3. Full-time undergraduate students can now receive a scholarship of **up to 16 credits**.
- 4. AVT/diploma/certificate students will now receive \$10 per clock hour.





Construction of 72 units Underway in Grand Traverse County for GTB Members

The Kchi-Noodin Kaamdaakiing development is 72.51 acres of trust property located off Herkner Road in Traverse City. First acquired by the Tribe in 2014 with a fee-to-trust application being submitted in 2016 and then accepted into trust in 2017.

Development of 16 Market Rental Units were constructed and opened to Tribal Member residents in October of 2019. Since then, the Housing Department has been dedicated to securing funding for additional units, specifically affordable, income-based housing, for the Grand Traverse Band Members who desire to live in Grand Traverse County.

Many applications were submitted with successful Low Income Housing Tax Credit applications being funded from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority, Competitive Indian Housing Block Grant applications being funded by HUD, GTB equity, and gap financing applications still awaiting wordon award notices. 

June-July 2024 update from the FishPass Team. Future updates will be provided monthly. The Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indian's (GTB) application for \$11.9M has been recommended for funding from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) for land acquisition and protection as well as Lower Boardman-Ottaway River restoration in association with FishPass.

NOAA funding will be used at FishPass to install over two thousand native live-stake plantings along the 400-ft long bypass channel as well as efforts to restore and rejuvenate instream habitat features supporting coastal resiliency. Furthermore, GTB elders and youth will work closely with GLFC to ensure that Anishinaabek culture (past and present) is reflected in broader education and placemaking elements associated FishPass/Giigook man-jowag. This funding will also support the creation of a new Public Engagement Officer position,

Construction activity FishPass will increase in August with the installation of a temporary sheet pile cofferdam. The cofferdam will allow all construction work to be accomplished safely and under dry conditions. from ~200 ft downstream of

Cass Rd. Bridge to ~100 ft upstream of Union St. Bridge (See Figure 1). During this time, the new dam spillway and bypass channel will be installed and the existing fish ladder and auxiliary spillway will be demolished. Sheet pile installation will occur, not continuously, between August and October. Heavy construction activities will be restricted to weekdays only, between 8 am and 5 pm.

RESEARCH/ASSESSMENT

Sethu Jagadeesan, Jordan Leh, 1) Jonathon Gregory, and Dr. Jesse Eickholt (Central Michigan University) and Dr. Daniel Zielinski (GLFC) published a research article as part of the 3rd International Conference on Computing and entitled Intelligence "Evaluating the effectiveness of an object detection pipeline to support surveillance of unintended passage". The paper introduces a new method for monitoring fish, specifically to detect when they jump out of the water. The machine learning model was found to accurately find and locate fish within video recordings made during operation of the DNR weir in

proved effective in detecting fish jumps, showing promise for real-time monitoring. This study offers a new, efficient approach to fish surveillance that will be applied as an early warning system to monitor for potential unintended fish passage at FishPass. The article is available upon request.

A research team led by FishPass Science Team members (Dr. Daniel Zielinski – Great Lakes Fishery Commission, Dr. Ana Silva – Norwegian Institute for Nature Research, and Dr. Andrew Goodwin – U.S. Army Engineer Research and Development Center) conducted a systematic literature review to collect and compile the breadth of available knowledge on different alternative methods for modeling fish movement near infrastructure (like Fish Pass) and past migratory barriers. In the recently published paper entitled "Advancements in Riverine Fish Movement Modeling: Bridging Environmental Complexity and Fish Behavior", the team reported that despite the lack of consistency in modelling framework, all 38 reviewed models imposed some combination of the following response behaviors: to flow direction (i.e., rheotaxis), flow velocity magnitude, turbulence, depth, and memory/experience of the individual. Through the review, the team also identified knowledge gaps and areas requiring further attention and development, providing a roadmap for research priorities and technical development of agentbased models for fish migratory movement that can help inform FishPass research and optimization of selective fish passage. The article is available for free at https:// www.tandfonline.com/doi/full/10 <u>.1080/23308249.2024.2374964</u>.

July 2024 – Staff from the GLFC, GTB, and U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) retrieved, downloaded, collected, and re-deployed acoustic fish telemetry receivers used for Determining Connectivity Between the Boardman River, Grand Traverse Bay, and Lake Michigan Proper in Support of FishPass project (Figure 2). Note

that some of the receivers that were previously deployed in the Boardman/Ottaway River

estuary have now been removed as that portion of the project data collection is now complete (See Figure 2). Staff from the USGS and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) retrieved, downloaded, deployed and re- deployed acoustic receivers in outlying areas of Grand Traverse Bay and Lake Michigan. These receivers are part of the GLATOS network and support numerous ongoing projects including those specific to FishPass.

16 July 2024 – Staff from the GLFC, GTB, Conservation Resource Alliance, and Grand Traverse Conservation District conducted a two-pass electrofishing survey at the Forks long-term monitoring site. As part of this work, the team counted and measured all fish captured and estimated population numbers of brook and brown trout and a pooled estimate of slimy and mottled sculpins (**Table 1**).

25 July 2024 – GLFC and GTB staff completed the second scheduled "quarterly" index electrofishing survey in the lower Boardman/Ottaway River (below Union St. Dam). These surveys are conducted to understand the seasonal diversity and abundance of fish species inhabiting the Boardman/Ottaway River (**Table 2**).

GTB Fire Department Hosts Successful 2nd Annual National Night Out Event



National Night Out Brings Together GTB and Leelanau County First Responders

For many folks, the only interactions they have with first responders is during a time of crises. In these stressful moments its easy to not know who it was who put out that fire, made you feel safe on the way to the hospital in an ambulance or protected you from a dangerous situation. In almost every case, even though you want to, you almost never get the chance to say thank you. For other people, you may not have needed those service and may not even know who provides them to your community. National Night Out was created to created as a means for the community to build a relationship with its first responders at a time that is not a crisis. A time to meet your first responders, ask questions, and show your support for what they do.

National night out was introduced in 1984 on the first Tuesday in August and was celebrated 400 communities in 23 states for its inaugural year. In 2023, 17.000 communities in every state celebrated National Night Out. One of those communities was your very own GTB and Leelanau County community for their first annual national night out. GTB Fire, alongside GTB Police, came together with members of the GTB Behavioral Health Services, Leland Township Fire Department, Leelanau



Township Fire Department (Northport), Suttons Bay-Bingam Fire Department, Elmwood Township Fire Department, Mobile Medical Response Ambulance, County Sheriff's Leelanau Office, Michigan State police, and Cherryland Electric to provide a safe place to educate and celebrate with GTB and Leelanau County communities. Agency members introduced themselves, showed off equipment, and provide education about what they do. In 2024 the GTB Agricultural Department's Will Derouin and CJ Minzey joined in to provide a community dinner mainly made from locally grown and sourced ingredients. Both the 2023 and 2024 events were MCed by GTB Community member Scott Scholten. Scott, who has worked as a first responder in the past and currently

Preventing Fires This Fall: Expert Tips from GTB Fire Chief Fairchild

As the fall season brings cooler temperatures outside, inside things are warming up. During the fall and winter months fire hazards in your home or business stem largely from heating the space. According to the American Red Cross there is even a drastic increase in the amount of US house fires during this time.

Fire Chief Garret Fairchild gathered the following fire safety tips and fire prevention techniques to help you stay safe during the during the following months.

- 1. Replace the batteries in your smoke alarms & locate fire extinguishers.
 - 2. Develop a home fire safety and evacuation plan.
- 3. Bring fire safety to work through proper training and a post-fire recovery plan.
 - 4. Check your Heating System!

Here are a few things you can do to reduce the risk of furnace fires:

- Regularly replace furnace filters.
- Keep all areas around the furnace clean and unobstructed.
- Keep the burner area clean and clear of debris.
- Keep all combustible items at least six-inches away from the vent pipe.
 - Never close off more than 20% of heat registers.

If there are any issues with your heating system, contact a professional immediately. For preventative care, have your central heating system cleaned and serviced by a certified HVAC contractor once annually.

5. Keep your fireplace clear of debris, and have it inspected each year.

Additionally, here are a few things you can do to enhance fireplace safety:

- Use a fireplace screen, guard, or glass doors to keep hot ash and sparks contained.
- Store extra wood, and other types of combustible materials, at least five-feet away from your fireplace.
 - Never leave a fire unattended.
- Burn seasoned hardwoods, such as oak, that have been split and stored in a safe and dry environment for at least sixmonths.
 - Keep fires small Never overload your fireplace.
- When building a fire, strategically place logs on a metal grate at the back end of your fireplace; always use kindling to ignite fire.
